CHANGING MINDS CAMPAIGN

It is often hard for us to change our minds and even more difficult to change the minds of others. When it comes to changing the minds of the general public about people who have been incarcerated, it is even more difficult. That is why the new project from the *Illinois Institute for Community Law and Affairs Changing Minds Campaign* is so important. Check out this excerpt from their website and visit that site for more resources:

"The Campaign, in development over the last year, is intended to reduce the stigma that the public, the media, employers, legislators and too many others impose on persons released from prison and those serving their sentences with dignity. As a result of this stigma, persons released from prison face overwhelming obstacles to successful and meaningful reentry; and persons in prison are deprived of the opportunity to learn new skills to use on release; and legislators are afraid to do anything positive for prisoners and former prisoners, fearful of being labeled soft on crime. The Campaign, using a variety of approaches, is an experiment designed to learn what might change or modify the attitudes that create this terrible stigma. You will hear readings written by men in prison and former female prisoners, and read by people who served time at the prisons where the readings are set. You will participate in meaningful discussion with the readers, seeing, as others have at the 26 performances to date-that persons who have served long sentences for serious convictions can and have changed, that they are not a risk to society.

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MALACHI DADS AND COMPANIONS PARTNER



Malachi Dads trains and equips inmates to become better fathers in an age when millions of children are growing up without dads who are in prison. Based on Malachi 4:6 from the Bible, the program develops inmates' skills in five key areas: fathering, spiritual, educational, moral and vocational skills. Companions has partnered with Malachi Dads at Kane County Jail. At the end of each parenting class, the men


Because of YOU, the storybook project is spreading to other areas of Illinois. We are grateful for the sacrifices you make in furthering Companions Journeying Together.

MORE PROGRAM NEWS

MOTHERS' DAY

This year we delivered 5,500 packets to women and juveniles in 20 institutions all across Illinois. We appreciate each of you who contributed materials, money and time to making the packets and want you to know that we have received many notes of thanks from prison & jail officials, and from those who received the packets. The most noteworthy was a very large poster board card made and signed by the youth at the Cook County Juvenile Temporary Detention.



"I was sitting alone thinking of my poor mother who is always there for me, wishing that I could send her a card for Mother's Day. I know she is at home worrying about me in prison, and that makes me all the more depressed. All of a sudden, I received this package of cards from an officer on day shift. The Lord heard me and answered me. I wanted to thank you from my heart for these wonderful cards. Know that I appreciate the time and effort you have put into this to make it happen. COUNTY NEWS

Often we are asked what the differences are between a jail and a prison. Jails are local county facilities where people go when they are arrested and charged with a crime. They have not necessarily been found guilty of a crime. Many low income people are unable to make bail, and therefore remain in jail while the court proceeds with their case. Some people leave jail when charges are dropped, or they have been found not guilty in a trial or other court proceedings. Some people may be sentenced to a crime and will "do their time" in a county facility.

A prison is a state facility that is managed by the Illinois Department of Corrections. People go to prison when they have been sentenced to a crime that requires a specific amount of time be served according to state mandates and the discretion of the sentencing body and the judge.



The version of Aunt Mary's Storybook Project that we run in county facilities is extremely important--the men and women in these facilities have been recently separated from their children, and the loss is particularly acute because there is so much uncertainty about the outcome of the cases. Contact and reassurance can come in a book and a CD from a parent, and we see so clearly that while these men and women are in prison, they are also parents who love and miss their children.

From Jeffery:

"I have been in prison for almost twenty years. By the grace of God I have come into contact with my daughter. It has been all of those twenty years since I last saw her. She happened to watch a TV show called *Lockup* that was taped in the Stateville Correctional Center. I was on the show talking about how it feels to be away from my family. My daughter recognized me from my photos.

I was in my cell watching TV when the officer slid a letter under the door. I saw her name on the envelope. Tears of joy came like running water. We have been writing each other but have not yet been able to see each other. We are working on that.

What a blessing!"
