
Yet through it all, we know that **persistence**, **purpose and passion** are never in short supply because of our donors, volunteers and friends.

As a Board Member of Companions, Journeying Together, Inc., I take pleasure in being able to give back in some way to a community I spent my career with. I retired from the Illinois Department of Corrections as Deputy Director of Women and Family Services having been a former Warden of the Dwight Correctional Center. It did not take long for me to realize the many ways I missed the usefulness I felt during my career in which I could be of assistance to women in prison.

I was blessed to be able to work in faith-based environment while being able to offer women the opportunity to acquire skills, to build self-esteem and to gain courage to make decisions to change their lives. Companions Journeying Together, Inc. volunteers were always there to lend their assistance through their many ministries and faithfulness. Learning from the volunteers, offenders often were able to give back by ministering to others in the prison community and to their own families.

Many women offenders have children, and like all of us, have made mistakes. Helping them to understand forgiveness and to reach within themselves to make a difference in their children's lives is very moving.

Having been "inside", I know that my continued involvement with Companions contributes to the welfare of mothers and their children. I have seen the difference this connection to the free world makes for offenders who are often abandoned while in prison. Offenders are often amazed by the care and concern given them by the free community, many experiencing such care for the first time. Many have never experienced the power of prayer. Through the contributions of many, offenders are often able to better meet their own needs.

I know whatever I do to minister to those in prison makes a difference because I was there and was witness to it. With God's guidance, I am hopeful my involvement with Companions will continue to make a difference in the lives of others.

FROM A HOSPICE VOLUNTEER AT DIXON CORRECTIONAL CENTER

"My name is Steven, and I am a hospice/adult care volunteer at Dixon Correctional Center since 2006. In my almost 30 years of incarceration, this program is, without question, one of the most beneficial I've ever been a part of. It was great to hear that the Hospice Program is up and running at Dwight.

Currently I have four patients. Thankfully, all of them only need Adult Care (laundry, cleaning duties, minor chores), but I have had patients who were terminally ill. I prayed and held the hands of two men who passed on during my watch. Nobody wants to die alone, and the staff and inmate volunteers pride themselves on their/our high standards. Even though we are convicted men, we strive to treat all of God's creatures with dignity and respect, especially those who are sick and infirm.

I have 18 months remaining on my sentence. I plan to volunteer in some capacity once I'm paroled. If I can help in any way, please feel free to contact me." —Steven

The young man who shared that he was proposing to his girl friend the next day. And the woman who was buying gifts for her six teenagers, who included quintuplets. In addition three of us worked 8 hours at a Barnes & Noble in St. Charles. Thanks to all who participated, and all who have been donating paper and bows for next year's efforts. And, Jenny, we love you.
